Cyrene and Apollonia

By R. G. Goodchild (120 pages, 5 figures, 8 plates)

This booklet, revised in 1963 and reprinted in 1970, remains the most recent general guide in English to the history and archaeology of the spectacular Cyrenaican sites of Apollonia and Cyrene. With the aid of several site plans and a clear commentary, the reader is taken on a step by step tour of each site. As well as being invaluable to the casual tourist, this is also a convenient and accessible summary for the archaeologist.

LIBYAN STUDIES Selected Papers of the late R. G. Goodchild

Edited by Joyce Reynolds (345 pages, 75 figures, 96 photographs)

This volume contains nineteen of Goodchild's most important articles on Libya. The topics covered include his classic works on Tripolitanian and Cyrenaican frontier archaeology and the ancient coastal cities, as well as three previously unpublished articles (on Synesius of Cyrene, Roman coin hoards from Lepcis Magna, and inscriptions from western Tarhuna). In addition, there are also nine chapters of an unfinished book which wittily and entertainingly relate the history of the archaeology and the Antiquities Service of Cyrene from the nineteenth century to the postwar period.

BERENICE I Excavations at Sidi Khrebish, Benghazi (Berenice), Volume I

Edited by J. A. Lloyd (311 pages of English text, 71 figures, 32 plates, extensive Arabic summary)

This is the first of a series of four final reports on the extensive rescue excavations conducted by the Society for Libyan Studies and the Libyan Department of Antiquities in Benghazi from 1971 to 1976. These excavations systematically uncovered a large quarter of the ancient city of Berenice and have shed important new light on its development from the third century BC through to the eleventh century AD.

This volume carries the main site report (by J. A. Lloyd), including the Ptolemaic and later Roman defences, numerous houses and public buildings of the Ptolemaic and Roman periods, a Byzantine church, the civic water supply systems and light industrial installations; full publication of the inscriptions from the site (by J. M. Reynolds), including the important 'Pirate' text of the first century BC and revised readings of the earlier inscriptions from Berenice; a catalogue of the 500 or so coins from the site (by R. Reece) and a catalogue and discussion (by F. B. Sear) of the architectural elements found during the excavations. An analysis of 168 deposits (edited by P. M. Kenrick), including numerous well and cistern groups, forms the principal dating evidence fot the site and its structures.

BERENICE II

Excavations at Sidi Khrebish, Benghazi (Berenice), Volume II

Edited by J. A. Lloyd (467 pages of English text, 144 figures, 43 plates, Arabic summary)

This is the first of the final reports on the finds from the stratified rescue exavations in Benghazi conducted by the Society for Libyan Studies and the Libyan Department of Antiquities from 1971 to 1976. The dated deposits from the excavations span the period from the third century BC to the eleventh century AD.

Berenice II contains an important discussion of the economic life of Berenice (by G. W. W. Barker, with contributions by A. Wheeler and D. Webley) based on the first detailed study in Libya of stratified animal and fish bones, marine molluscs and plant remains. It also contains the full publication of the sculpture and terracottas from the excavations (by A. Bonnano), including the wide variety of locally crafted products.

The bulk of the volume comprises the first dated type series of the Hellenistic and Roman amphoras and coarse pottery of this part of North Africa (by J. A. Riley), together with details of the relative proportions of each type in various periods distilled from a study of tens of thousands of stratified sherds. The work, which offers a full discussion with distribution maps of the abundant imported wares, is not only indispensable for excavators in Libya but also of considerable relevance for archaeologists and economic historians concerned with the whole Mediterranean region.
