VINCENT HARDING, who has just completed a stint at the University of Pennsylvania, is Chairman of the Institute of the Black World in Atlanta. THEODORE M. HESBURGH, of the Congregation of Holy Cross, has been President of Notre Dame since 1952.

BROTHER BERNARD DONAHOE, of the Congregation of Holy Cross, teaches American History at St. Mary's College, Notre Dame. THOMAS J. SCHLERETH teaches in the Notre Dame Program in American Studies. JOHN LYON is chairman of the General Program of Liberal Studies at Notre Dame. FAUZI M. NAJJAR is Professor of Political Science at Michigan State. STANLEY HAUERWAS is Professor of Theology at Notre Dame. EDWARD FISCHER'S most recent book, *Light in the* Far East, will be published in the fall. DONALD N. BARRETT teaches Sociology at Notre Dame. ALFRED M. DE ZAYAS is a member of the faculty of the Institut für Völkerrecht of the University of Göttingen. KEN WOLF, a Professor at Murray (Ky.) State University, is teaching this summer in Austria. Stephen T, Worland teaches Economics at Notre Dame.
