We are currently researching the feasability of some applications of solar energy at the rural level in the Sahel - these studies could lead us on to joint ventures with local institutions or production units in the future. We feel that problems of deforestation, fuel shortage and rising fuel costs make it imperative that changes are made to the present mode of energy consumption, specifically in regard to domestic fuel consumption in rural areas. At the moment we are constructing an economic analysis paper to formally assess the viability of our project and for this we require certain information about the comparative costs of fuels, labour trends, etc....

We would be most grateful if you could aid us in our research by providing us with the following information, either by referring us to an informed person or institution or by supplying the relevant data, if you have access to it. The information we require relates to eighteen countries in Sub-Saharan Africa, but most specifically to the first six mentioned below:

1. Chad

2. Mali

3. Mauritania

4. Niger

- 5. Senegal
- 6. Upper Volta

Also Benin, Cameroon, Ethiopia, Ghana, Guinea, Kenya, Nigeria, Somalia, Sudan, Togo, Uganda and Ivory Coast.

- Annual domestic prices for the following fuels from the year 1965 to the present.
 - (a) Woodfuel
- (b) Charcoal
- (c) Electricity

- (d) Kerosene
- (e) Butane

- 2. The minimum wage This could be taken as the minimum agricultural wage paid to workers at present and over the past 10 years.
- 3. The rate of employment of the labour force at present and over the past $10\ \mathrm{years}$.
- 4. The current costs of the initiation and maintenance of a forestry plantation (for fuelwood). This last point would require complicated information on the costs of all materials and processes per hectare up to the actual felling of trees. We would also need to know the yield per hectare within the plantation.
