BIRTHPLACE OF THE HUNTERS

The Times (24 August 1956) gave an account of the appeal for an endowment fund of $\pounds 20,000$ to maintain the birthplace of William and John Hunter at Long Calderwood, East Kilbride, as a place of pilgrimage, a museum, and a possible research centre. More than $\pounds 2,000$ has already been raised in Scotland towards the cost of restoring the fabric of the old farm-house, but a further $\pounds 1,500$ is urgently required to complete this first stage of the project. The wider appeal is sponsored by the East Kilbride Development Corporation, Glasgow University, the Royal Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow, and the Western Regional Hospital Board. MEDICAL HISTORY CONGRESS RIO DE JANEIRO, 1957

A JOINT meeting of the First Pan-American Congress of the History of Medicine and the Third Brazilian Congress of the History of Medicine will be held at Rio de Janeiro, 14–21 April 1957. The Congress is being organized by the Instituto Brasileiro de Historia da Medicina and the Secretary-General is Dr. Ordical Cassiano Gomes, Rua México, 164–2° Andar, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. The main theme of the Congress will be Pre-Colombian Medicine, but papers on other aspects of the history of medicine and its related sciences and on medical philosophy, ethics, literature and folk-lore, may also be presented. Papers which should not exceed thirty double-spaced typewritten pages, must be sent to the Secretary-General before 28 February 1957.
