THE INSTITUTE FOR ADVANCED STUDY: SCHOOL OF HISTORICAL STUDIES announces fellowships for research in the history, thought and culture of the western world. The Ph.D. (or equivalent) and publications are required. Qualified candidates of any nationality may apply for one or two terms. Some travel funds are available. Applications for 1988–89 are due before October 15, 1987. THE FOLGER SHAKESPEARE LIBRARY FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMS, 1988–89. Short-term doctoral fellowships with stipends up to \$1,500 per month for a term of one to three months will be available during June 1988 to May 1989. A completed application requires three copies of the applicant's c.v., three copies of a 500-word description of the research project, plus three letters of recommendation submitted directly to the Fellowship Committee. The deadline for completed applications is March 1, 1988.

National Endowment for the Humanities Senior Fellowships and Folger Senior Fellowships: a limited number of these fellowships will be available to senior scholars who have made substantial contributions in their fields of research and who are pursuing research projects appropriate to the collections of the Folger. Fellowships are for six to nine months to be used between September 1988 and August 1989. They carry stipends of \$13,750 and \$20,625, respectively. Applicants should submit five copies of both a 500-word description and a c.v., including a list of publications, plus three letters of recommendation sent directly to the Fellowship Committee. The deadline for completed applications is November 1, 1987.

THE COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY SOCIETY OF FELLOWS IN THE HU-MANITIES, with grants from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and the William R. Kenan Trust, will appoint a number of postdoctoral fellows in the humanities for the academic year 1988–89. The appointment carries the expectation of renewal for a second year. Fellows newly appointed for 1988–1989 must have received the Ph.D. between January 1, 1985 and July 1, 1988. The stipend will be \$27,500, one half for independent research and one half for teaching in the undergraduate program in general education. Additional funds are available to support research. NATIONAL HUMANITIES CENTER FELLOWSHIPS 1988–89. The National Humanities Center, North Carolina, announces the availability of 35-40 fellowships. Most are for the academic year, but a few are available for the fall or spring semester. Senior scholars and younger scholars (several years past the doctorate) may apply. Scholars from any nation are eligible. In addition to fields normally associated with the humanities, applications are welcomed from representatives of the social sciences, the arts, the professions, and public life. While in residence at the Center and pursuing individual projects, scholars are invited to take part in the various activities offered: interdisciplinary seminars, lectures, conferences, etc. Stipends are based on the scholars' usual academic salaries and amounts vary according to the outside help given each scholar. All Fellows receive travel expenses to and from the Center for themselves and their families. Applications, postmarked by October 15, 1987, consist of a form (available from the Center), a curriculum vitae, a 1,000 word project proposal and three letters of recommendation.
