The Cambridge History of China Edited by JOHN K. FAIRBANK and DENIS TWITCHETT

This latest Cambridge History is one of the most far-reaching works of international scholarship ever undertaken and one which will open a new era in our understanding of the Chinese past. Planned to be complete by the early 1980s it will extend to fourteen volumes and will explore the main developments in political, social, economic and intellectual life from the Ch'in Empire (pre-200 BC) to the present day. The contributors are specialists from the international community of sinological scholars. Many of their accounts break new ground; all are based on fresh research.

Volume 10: Late Ch'ing, 1800–1911, Part 1 Edited by JOHN K. FAIRBANK

Volume 10, the first to be published, covers the period from 1800 to about 1870 when the Western world first made a profound impact on China. The period was characterised by the dynastic decline of the Ch'ing Empire and by domestic revolt, culminating in the Taiping rebellion. The authors survey the Opium War and the treaty system whereby the victorious Western powers occupied the principal ports. Central Asian developments are also studied, as is the successful restoration of imperial power following the collapse of the Taiping forces. Numerous maps illustrate the text, and each chapter has a separate bibliographical essay.
