ST. ANSELM AND HIS CRITICS

A Re-interpretation of the Cur Deus Homo

The purpose of this book is to re-assess the Cur Deus Homo in the light of modern insight into the nature of theological method and into the autonomy of theological concepts.

Principal McIntyre fulfils his purpose in the following ways. First, by reviewing St. Anselm's own statements on and use of the *credo ut intelligam* principle, and by discussing modern commentaries on it he brings out the full meaning of the principle, and shows how the *Cur Deus Homo* contributes to its true understanding.

Secondly, the regulative concepts of the work—such as sin, debt, satisfaction, punishment, for-giveness and the aseity of God—are examined and the extent to which they are reducible to commercial, legal or feudal antecedents discussed. Thirdly, the author analyses in detail the criticisms of St. Anselm's theory and shows how little real originality has appeared since Harnack. Finally, he studies the importance in St. Anselm's argumentation of the aseity of God and shows how this concept reveals the true nature of his alleged 'rationalism' and allows his soteriology to establish itself as supremely a theologia gratiae.
