POLIOMYELITIS INOCULATION AND THE REMOVAL OF TONSILS AND ADENOIDS

The Council recommends that children should be inoculated against poliomyelitis before the removal of tonsils and adenoids. As a safeguard the ear, nose and throat specialist should ascertain from the parent whether the child has received its second inoculation.

It is appreciated that no direct pressure can be brought to bear on parents if they do not wish to have their child inoculated and they can only be warned of the possible risks.

PROPOSED HEARING AND SPEECH CENTRE AT THE ROYAL NATIONAL THROAT, NOSE AND EAR HOSPITAL

The Trustees of the Nuffield Foundation have offered a grant of £60,000 for the erection of a Hearing and Speech Centre attached to the Royal National Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital and its associated Institute of Laryngology and Otology.

The new Centre will be concerned with the diagnosis, assessment and development of hearing and speech in children suffering from impairment or total loss of these faculties.

The Centre will also be actively engaged in research into the whole problem presented by congenital and acquired deafness, and with the special training in this field of doctors and other professional workers such as psychologists, teachers of the deaf, speech therapists, health visitors and social workers. It is hoped that the Centre will generally be a focal point for all who are concerned in the care of the deaf child.

Building work will commence within the next few months.

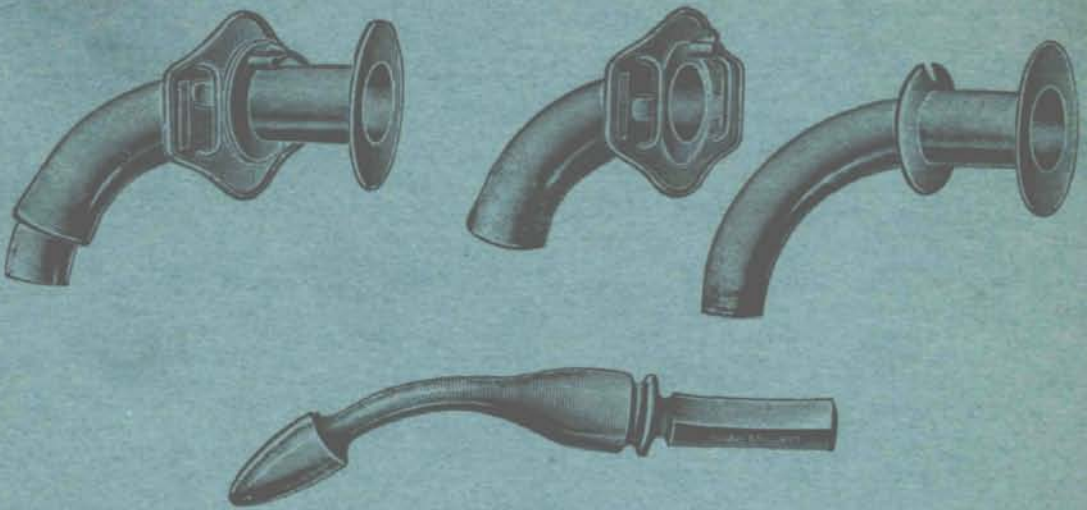
