The Soviet Cultural Offensive

Professor Barghoorn, who served for four years in the U.S. Embassy in Moscow and who has made three trips to the USSR since 1956, analyzes the role of Soviet cultural diplomacy in areas of the free world. On the basis of official Soviet statements and of the historical record of Soviet actions, he shows the ways in which the Soviet state tries to use cultural exchange for its own purposes and what the Kremlin hopes to gain, pointing out the difficulties and the rewards of continuing exchanges.
