THE ASSOCIATION

The Board of Directors of the AAASS held its annual meeting at Indiana University on October 25, 1964. It was decided to hold national conventions every three years, the next to be held in the spring of 1967. President Berliner reported that the one-year tenure of the presidency is too short to permit the president to assume full responsibility for managing the tight finances of the Association and for organizing the national convention. It was moved and passed that future presidents be asked to serve for three years, the installation of incoming presidents to take place at the national convention. Since the constitution empowers the Board of Directors to reelect officers, no constitutional amendment is required.

Professor John A. Armstrong was unanimously elected president of the AAASS, to serve until the 1967 convention. Election of a vice president was postponed, pending clarification of the role of vice president under the new three-year presidential term.

The report of the Nominating Committee for new directors was accepted.

The final report of Managing Editor Donald W. Treadgold was presented in his absence by the incoming editor, Henry L. Roberts. The Board passed a vote expressing the deep appreciation of the AAASS to Professor Treadgold for his dedicated and imaginative guidance of the Slavic Review during his tenure of office.

Far Western Slavic Conference: The next annual two-day meeting is scheduled for April 10-11, 1965, at the Claremont Graduate School, Claremont, California. Joseph F. Zacek, Occidental College, is program chairman, and Gregory Grossman, University of California, Berkeley, is deputy chairman. Members of the program committee are Gleb Struve, University of California, Berkeley; Imre Boba, University of Washington; R. C. Gripp, San Diego State College, H. L. Kostanick, University of California, Los Angeles; Victor O. Buyniak, University of Saskatchewan; Bernice Madison, San Francisco State College; and Peter Toma, University of Arizona.

Midwest Slavic and East European Conference: The University of Kansas is the site for the third meeting, planned for April 9-10, 1965. The chairman is Herbert Ellison, and the secretary-treasurer Roy Laird, both of the University of Kansas.

Southern Conference on Slavic Studies: The third annual meeting was held at Louisiana State University and Tulane University in New Orleans, October 15-17, 1964. President of the conference was C. Jay Smith of the University of Georgia, with Jordan E. Kurland, University of North Carolina at Greensboro, as program chairman. Serving as secretary-treasurer and in charge of local arrangements was Paul Debreczeny of Tulane University. Guest speaker was Hans Kohn of the University of Texas.

Thomas T. Hammond of the University of Virginia was elected to the presidency of the Southern Conference for 1965; Nashville, Tennessee, was selected as the place of the 1965 meeting, with Josef Rysan, of Vanderbilt, named secretary-treasurer and placed in charge of local arrangements. Warren Lerner, of Duke, was appointed program chairman. Jordan E. Kurland was appointed head of a committee to draft a constitution for the Conference.

Other officers for the coming year are vice president: Walter W. Arndt, University of North Carolina; executive committee through 1967: Paul Debreczeny, Tulane University, and Kermit E. McKenzie, Emory University; through 1966: Kurt Rosenbaum, University of West Virginia, and Mary-Barbara Zeldin, Hollins College; through 1965: Clifford M. Foust, University of North Carolina, and Edward D. Sokol, University of South Carolina.

Southwest Conference on Slavic Studies: The next meeting is scheduled for April 1965 and will again be held in Dallas in connection with the annual meeting of the Southwest Social Science Association.

Bi-State Slavic Conference: This year's conference was held at the University of Missouri on October 17, 1964. R. E. McGrew, University of Missouri, was chairman. W. Robert Brazleton of the University of Missouri at Kansas City will be chairman for the 1965 conference, to be held at that institution in the early fall. Stan Gerber of UMKC is the new secretary, succeeding Will Adams, William Jewell College.

Conference on Soviet Agricultural and Peasant Affairs: A meeting of this group under the title "Conference on Soviet and East European Agriculture" is planned for August 26-28, 1965, at the University of California, Santa Barbara. Jerzy Karcz of the host institution is program chairman.

Membership in the AAASS is open to all persons interested in furthering Slavic, East European, and Soviet bloc studies. Regular memberships are \$10 per year; sustaining memberships are \$25 per year. A special student rate of \$5 per year (without vote) is available to persons who are full-time students or students with teaching assistantships. (Higher postage costs, unfortunately, limit the \$5 rate to those with U.S. mailing addresses. Students elsewhere may join as regular members.) There are also nonvoting associate memberships at \$10 per year. Joint memberships are available for a married couple both of whom wish to join the Corporation but who need only one copy of the publications; both names will be listed, but the fee (\$10 per year) and voting rights are those of a single membership.
