

ZANZIBAR: Background to Revolution

BY MICHAEL F. LOFCHIE

The twofold importance of this book is that it gives a detailed analysis of the causes of the revolution of January 1964 in Zanzibar, and provides a study of the process of modernization in a plural society. The Arab community, which owned most of Zanzibar's arable land, had constituted a privileged political oligarchy since early in the 19th century. Mr. Lofchie seeks to explain why—even though this dominant Arab group did not exert repressive policies, although it established popular support, and in spite of the introduction of democratic political institutions—a revolution led by the African majority finally resulted. Brazil and Africa

JOSÉ HONÓRIO RODRIGUES. In this volume an articulate Brazilian scholar focuses on Afro-Brazilian relations, and in the light of his views on this question proposes an entire reorientation of Brazilian foreign policy. Brazil's ties to Africa, he maintains on the basis of an exhaustive historical review, are and ought to be stronger than those to Europe or the rest of America; and it is Brazil's special destiny as the home of an ethnically and culturally mixed race to serve as a link between the two continents. Rodrigues argues this general view through a series of striking "theses", bolstered by study of the contribution of the Negro to Brazilian diet, dress, art and architecture, literature, music, folklore, engineering, journalism, and politics. \$7.50
