#### THE LATE MR GUSTAVE GARCIA.

It is appropriate that we should make reference to the death, on the 13th June, of Mr Gustave Garcia, the son of Manuel Garcia, to whom we owe the introduction of the laryngoscope.

Gustave, like his father, was a well-known singer and professor of music. Born in Italy in 1837, he came to England in 1854 and became an apprentice in an engineering school. As he showed no ability in this direction, he entered a shipping-house in Manchester, but failing to succeed in this occupation, he proceeded to Paris to study singing.

For many years Gustave Garcia conducted an operatic school in Berners Street, and, in 1880, he was appointed Professsor at the Royal Academy of Music.

The family talent is continued in the third generation in the person of his son Albert, who has already appeared on the concert platform before London audiences.

# THE LATE DR R. H. SCANES SPICER, M.D.

We regret to record the death, on the 18th June, of Dr Scanes Spicer. Owing to impaired health, Dr Scanes Spicer was obliged to retire in 1913, from active practice in the specialty. An appreciation of his work will be published in a future number of the *Journal*.


