Manuscripts produced by ABF research fellows are evaluated by the same process as outside manuscripts and are not accorded priority in publication.

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Law and Social Inquiry does not accept multiply submitted articles. The Editors endeavor to make decisions promptly, usually about two months after submission.

The winner will be announced by May 1. *Law and Social Inquiry* publishes both empirical and theoretical studies of sociolegal processes from a variety of disciplinary perspectives.

The 1997 LSI Student Essay Prize Competition Winners

In 1996, the Editors inaugurated the LSI Student Essay Prize Competition. Our aim was to showcase the best work being done by graduate students in law and social science and to provide young scholars with an avenue to publication in an interdisciplinary forum. Entry was open to all graduate and law students in the U.S. and Canada. We received twentyeight papers, all but two from students in the U.S. We hope to boost international submission in future years.

The entries came primarily from students in sociology and law programs, although the disciplines of history, anthropology, political science, education, psychology, public administration, and ethnic studies were also represented. More than half came from students pursuing the Ph.D. Six were law students. Each of the prize submissions was read by two of the Editors or Associate Editors. The Editors narrowed the contenders to a group of seven and all of us read each of the finalists' essays.

We awarded the prize to Lisa Sanchez, a Ph.D. student in Criminology, Law, and Society at the University of California, Irvine. We also decided to recognize two honorable mentions: Gustav Peebles, an anthropology Ph.D. candidate at the University of Chicago, and Debra Schleef, who is completing her Ph.D. in sociology at Northwestern University. All three essays comprise the Summer 1997 issuse of *LSI*.

The Editors were heartily encouraged with the response to this year's competition and are pleased to announce that the prize will be an ongoing part of the journal's efforts to bring together the best new work in our diverse field of study.
