#### WHOLE-TIME COURSES FOR POSTGRADUATE STUDENTS

17 February-24 May 1969 and 5 August-1 November 1969

BASIC SCIENCES CLASS for Part I D.L.O. students.

This consists of approximately 50 lecture/demonstrations on the anatomy of the head, neck, thorax and brain; 20 lectures covering the physiological aspects; 6 on applied pharmacology; and 8 on histological and pathological and bacteriological subjects. Facilities are also available for dissection of the relevant parts, and this occupies about 120 hours.

#### 6 January-15 February 1969 and 30 June-9 August 1969

INTENSIVE CLINICAL LECTURE PERIOD for Part II D.L.O. and other students. These periods are primarily designed to give a clinical survey of the whole field of the Specialty as a preliminary to practical clinical training. At the completion of the Intensive Lecture Period, selected students may be given the opportunity to serve as house surgeons in the associated hospitals.

#### 19 May-31 May 1969 and 5 November-18 November 1969

PRACTICAL REVISION CLASS for Part II D.L.O. students.

This is intended for those students who are well advanced in preparation for the examination and need only the opportunity for a final review. The class includes demonstrations of selected clinical cases and viva voce examinations.

#### 17 March-29 March 1969 and 29 September-11 October 1969

This is limited to senior students who are about to take the Final examination. In addition to a series of lecture/discussions at the appropriate level in the Specialty and in related branches of general surgery, there are a number of clinical and viva voce sessions and arrangements for a number of clinical and viva voce sessions and arrangements for the setting and correction of test papers.

A copy of the syllabus giving full information about the teaching and research facilities provided by the Institute, and a detailed programme of any of the courses listed overleaf and of the short courses on specific aspects

which are arranged from time to time can be obtained from the Secretary-Administrator.

The clinical practice can be joined at any time by individual arrangement with the Dean.

This includes daily practical teaching in the clinics and operating theatres and ward-rounds and special demonstrations weekly.

Demonstrations of clinical cases, open clinical lectures and clinical pathological conferences are held at regular intervals throughout the year, and are open without fee to all trainees in the Specialty. A list giving dates and times is obtainable in the Secretary-Administrator's office.

Lunch will be provided in the Refectory after each seminar from 12.30 p.m. Practitioners who are able to accept the Institute's invitation to lunch are requested to notify the Secretary-Administrator at least one week beforehand.

The seminars will cover the field of otolaryngology in relation to common conditions encountered in general practice. There will be no formal lectures, and practitioners attending will have the opportunity to submit questions and to participate in discussions.

Each seminar will be conducted by a member of the Institute's panel of lecturers who is also a consultant on the staff of the associated hospital.

There is a limited number of appointments in the associated hospital as Clinical Assistants and Out-Patient Assistants for which general practitioners are eligible to apply. Courses of 2 months' duration (two afternoon sessions weekly) to train practitioners for similar appointments in their local hospitals are also available; members of these courses are eligible for a financial grant to cover travelling and subsistence expenses. COURSE ON SURGICAL TREATMENT OF CHRONIC OTITIS MEDIA A course on Surgical Treatment of Chronic Otitis Media will be held at the Theodor Heuss Academy and at the Municipal City Hospital in Gummersbach (Cologne), West Germany, from 27 to 30 May 1969.

The Course will include lectures, discussions, motion pictures, surgical demonstrations on colour closed circuit television and temporal bone work. The lectures and demonstrations will be in English. Simultaneous translations will be in Spanish, French and German. Special emphasis will be given to the technique of preservation of the posterior bony canal wall (posterior tympanotomy, intact canal wall technique).

Tuition fee:  $f_{105}$ , which includes transportation from Cologne Airport, hotel accommodation, with meals and social activities. Registration is limited.
