The society's aim is to encourage local groups and existing regional organizations of Renaissance scholars. Officers are F. D. Hoeniger (U of Toronto), President; J. M. De Bujanda (U de Sherbrooke), Vice-President; Olga Pugliese (U of Toronto), Secretary-Treasurer. The society will cosponsor the journal *Renaissance and Reformation*, published biannually in Toronto; the new editor is Richard Van Fossen (Erindale C, U of Toronto). The journal's business manager is John Priestley (Founders C, York U). Subscription to the journal is \$6 per year.

C. WILLIAM MILLER, member of the Editorial Board of RQ, has received the fifth triennial prize for bibliography awarded by the International League of Antiquarian Booksellers for his book, *Benjamin Franklin's Philadelphia Printing* (American Philosophical Society, 1974). A comprehensive and scholarly study of Franklin's colonial printing from 1728 to 1766 (with nearly 1500 items), it is a major contribution to the study of American culture in the eighteenth century. Mr. Miller (Temple U), the first American to win the award, spoke on 'Benjamin Franklin and the Booksellers' at the annual meeting of the Antiquarian Booksellers Association of America in March, when the formal presentation was made.

NEWS AND NOTES

THE FRANCIS BACON LIBRARY, Claremont, California, held its annual Bacon Birthday Celebration January 21, 1977. John T. Blackmore (Harvey Mudd C) spoke on 'Implementing the Next Stage of Bacon's Philosophy,' and Albert B. Friedman on 'Bacon the Mythographer.'

JOYFUL SYMMETRY: MEASURE AND PATTERN IN RENAISSANCE LITERATURE was the title of a symposium sponsored by the Five Colleges, Amherst, Hampshire, Mount Holyoke, Smith, and the University of Massachusetts, January 21-22, 1977. The Symposium, which washeld at Amherst College, dealt with some aspects of numerology, alchemy, and the Renaissance occult tradition. Papers were presented on the works of Petrarch, Boccaccio, Giordano Bruno, Maurice Scève, Montaigne, Shakespeare, Spenser, and Giles Fletcher.

THE WALTERS ART GALLERY, Baltimore, offered a major exhibition, 'Masters of Italian Painting, 1300–1800,' November 22, 1976 – February 13, 1977. The exhibition was arranged to coincide with the publication of a new catalogue, *Italian Paintings in the Walters Art Gallery*, by Federico Zeri. The majority of the Italian paintings in the Walters Gallery were acquired by Mr. Henry Walters in 1902 with the purchase of the private collection of Marcello Massarenti, of Rome.

THE NEWBERRY LIBRARY held an exhibition of material from the Duke August Library of Wolfenbüttel, Germany, January 14 – February 10, 1977. The exhibition, entitled 'The New World in the Treasures of an Old European Library,' included books, maps, and engravings illustrating the discovery, exploration, and settlement of the New World. It was a West German contribution to the American Bicentennial celebration. The illustrated catalogue may be obtained from the Newberry Library, 50 West Walton Street, Chicago, Illinois 60610.

RECORDS OF EARLY ENGLISH DRAMA is a new research project which aims to locate, transcribe, and publish systematically the surviving unedited (or inadequately edited) performance records of dramatic, ceremonial, minstrel, and related entertainment activities throughout Britain before 1642. REED's international Editorial Advisory Board and editors include scholars from Australia, Canada, Great Britain, and the United States, and the project is linked with both the Early English

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Text Society and the Malone Society. Sponsored formally by the Centre for Medieval Studies, University of Toronto, REED has just been awarded a five-year editorial and research grant by the Canada Council. It will publish, through the University of Toronto Press, some thirty volumes of records, conference proceedings, and indexes. The first three volumes will be the records of York (edited by A. F. Johnston and M. Rogerson), Chester (edited by L. Clopper), and Coventry (edited by R. Ingram). The major organ of communication is the *REED Newsletter*, published semiannually. SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY HAS BEGUN CATALOGUING two major historical collections, the Leopold von Ranke Library and the Jan Novotny Collection. The von Ranke Library, of some seventeen thousand volumes, includes rare volumes on medieval and early modern European history and several thousand pamphlets and manuscripts, including the largest body of Venetian historical manuscripts in North America. The Novotny Collection is concerned mainly with economic history of the early modern period and contains many items printed in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries. The cataloguing, which will be directed by James M. Powell (Syracuse U), has been made possible by an outright grant of \$49,980 and a matching grant of \$50,037 from the National Endowment for the Humanities.
