Awards

Peter Beckett Postgraduate Research Award 1987

The family and friends of the late Professor Beckett, former Dean of the Medical Faculty and Professor of Psychiatry, Trinity College, The University of Dublin, have funded a research award, to be known as the Peter Beckett Postgraduate Research Award, with the purpose of encouraging research in psychiatry. The award will be made annually on the recommendation of a Committee comprising the Dean of the Medical School, the University Professor of Psychiatry, the Clinical Professor of Psychiatry and the Professor of Clinical Medicine, to the candidate who, in the opinion of the Committee, has carried out the best research project in psychiatry during his/her postgraduate training. The research should normally have been carried out in Ireland.

The award is open to all postgraduate trainees in psychiatry who have completed at least three years of a formal training programme approved by the Committee. The value of the award will be approximately £350. Applications should reach the Medical School Office, Faculty of Health Sciences, Trinity College, Dublin 2, Ireland not later than 31 December 1987 and each candidate should submit a full written description of the completed research project which he/she wishes to have considered.

The McHarg Prize

The Scottish Division of the Royal College of Psychiatrists offers a prize of $\pounds 100$ to a trainee who is working in Scotland and who is of senior registrar or registrar grade. Candidates for the prize are invited to submit essays or scientific papers based on their own studies or their original work. It is expected that submissions will range from essays based on literature review to descriptions of clinical work or research in the field. All entries will be considered by a panel set up by the Scottish Executive Committee and it is intended that the successful candidate will be invited to present his paper to a meeting of the Scottish Division.
