Volume I comprises the main site report (by J. A. Lloyd), including the Ptolemaic and later Roman defences, numerous houses and public buildings of Ptolemaic and Roman date, a Byzantine church, the civic water supply systems and light industrial installations; full publication of the inscriptions from the site (by J. M. Reynolds), a catalogue and discussion of the coins (by R. Reece) and of the architectural elements (by F. Sear) and an analysis of 168 dated deposits (by P. M. Kenrick).

Volume II contains an important discussion of the economic life at Berenice (by G. Barker) based on the first detailed study in Libya of stratified animal and fish bones, marine molluscs and plant remains and the full publication of the sculpture and terracottas from the excavations (by A. Bonanno). The bulk of the volume comprises the first dated type series of the Hellenistic and Roman amphoras and coarse pottery of this part of North Africa (by J. A. Riley), together with an analysis of the relative proportions of each type in various periods.

Volume III is in two parts:

Part 1 *The Fine Pottery* (by P. M. Kenrick) includes a detailed type series of the forms recorded in some 38 major categories of fine ware, spanning a period from the third century BC until the seventh century AD (more than 800 catalogued forms). Black-glazed wares, terra sigillata and other categories are documented from sources as far afield as Syria, the Black Sea and Gaul, providing important new evidence for trade patterns in the Mediterranean.

Part 2 *The Lamps* (by D. M. Bailey) consists of a catalogue of the many thousands of lamps and lampsheds recorded, of which over 1,200 examples are illustrated. The evidence of a substantial, but derivative, lamp-industry may be compared with the huge imports from Italy, Africa, Tripolitania, Greece, Crete and Asia Minor.

Ghirza: a Libyan Settlement of the Roman Period, by Olwen Brogan, O.B.E., M.A., F.S.A., and D. J. Smith, Ph.D., F.S.A. *Department of Antiquities of Tripolitania, Libya, 1984. A4, 311 pp. (inc. 15 appendices), 115 figs., 172 pl.*

Ghirza, 150 miles (240 km) south-east of Tripoli, is a late Roman site which with its environs comprises a large settlement, middens, cemeteries and other features, a spectacular series of monumental tombs, and a flood-control system for agriculture in the Wadi Ghirza. These are all described and illustrated in detail. The settlement flourished in the fourth and fifth centuries AD. One building was a temple of Semitic type which yielded altars inscribed in Libyan characters, not yet deciphered. The account of the tombs includes reconstructions and a catalogue of their reliefs. Pottery, lamps, and botanical evidence were collected from the middens.

The temple was reoccupied in the tenth and eleventh centuries, apparently by a merchant and his family. Its excavation yielded 81 fragments of textiles, wooden mirror-boxes, decorated and glazed as well as coarse pottery, Fatimid coins, and botanical evidence for this period also.

The appendices, by specialists and the authors themselves, include catalogues and discussions of the Roman and medieval pottery, glass, coins, inscriptions, and botanical evidence, finds from the temple, skeletal remains from the cemeteries, the mirror-boxes, and the textiles.
