THE CONTRIBUTORS

DAVID VITAL, an Israeli, is Lecturer in International Relations at the University of Sussex. He is the author of two forthcoming works, The Inequality of States: A Study of the Small Power in International Relations and The Making of British Foreign Policy.

JEROME M. GILISON is Assistant Professor of Political Science at The Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, Maryland.

LINDA B. MILLER is a Research Associate of the Center for International Affairs at Harvard. Her article in this issue was written while she was a Research Associate of the Center of International Studies, Princeton, on leave from Barnard College in 1966-1967.
