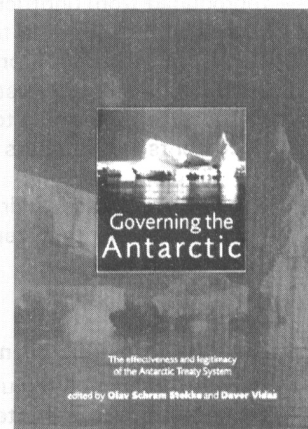
The Effectiveness and Legitimacy of the Antarctic Treaty System

Editorial Policy and Guidelines for Submission of Documents and Introductory Notes

Editorial Policy

International Legal Materials is a collection of current documents designed to provide up-to-date information to scholars, practicing lawyers, legal advisers to government agencies and corporations, national and international officials, and others concerned with the legal aspects of public and private international relations. These documents primarily consist of current materials not readily available in most libraries.

The term international law is interpreted broadly for the purposes of this publication. Some of the materials may be of a kind normally classified under other rubrics, such as foreign law, comparative law, conflict of laws, constitutional law, international organization, and the like. The main criterion of the Editorial Advisory Committee in selecting materials is that the documents be of substantial interest to a large number of legal scholars, practicing lawyers and officials dealing with public and private international matters. It is recognized that these interests may vary considerably among users of the publication in the United States and elsewhere.

International Legal Materials reproduces by photo-offset the official documents whenever possible. In some instances, the documents are reproduced from unofficial typescript when texts are unavailable or when a translation is given. A short "I.L.M. Background/Content Summary" precedes each document to assist in reviewing the materials. On occasion, "Introductory Notes" also accompany documents. The authors of such notes are identified.

Readers are invited to draw the Editor's attention to documents meriting reproduction in *International Legal Materials*.

Submission of Documents

Readers are invited to submit documents that would be of interest to the international legal community. *International Legal Materials* reproduces by photo-offset the official text of a document whenever possible; if the official version is not available in English, an unofficial translation is acceptable. The original language text must accompany unofficial English translations. The source of the document, e.g., a government department, a court, an embassy or an official gazette, should be clearly identified.

Submission of Introductory Notes

Readers are also invited to submit brief Introductory Notes to accompany documents in I.L.M. Introductory Notes are intended to provide background information for the document they accompany. They should be objective, without judgmental commentary. For example, Introductory Notes for treaties might include a short history of the negotiations, the dates of signature and entry into force; for legislation, its history and international significance; for judicial proceedings, the background of the case and a citation to the full text in the original language; for reports and other documents, background information as to the document's significance. If within the text of the document there are references to other documents, their relevance should be briefly explained in the Introductory Note.

Format

Introductory Notes should be between 750 and 1250 words in length. Both Introductory Notes and unofficial translations should be typed single-spaced with double-spacing between paragraphs. Authors and translators may send an additional copy of their submission on an IBM-compatible diskette. I.L.M. uses WordPerfect 5.1.

A statement giving the author's name, title, address, telephone and fax numbers must accompany all submissions.

Acceptance of Materials and Corrections

Submissions cannot be returned. Authors and translators will be notified of the acceptance of their Introductory Note or translation as soon as possible. Once a submission has been accepted for reproduction, the American Society of International Law will send the author or translator a Publication Agreement. Authors and translators will be acknowledged in I.L.M.

In some cases minor editorial or typographical alterations may be made without contacting author or translator. Major corrections will be sent to the author or translator for approval. Corrected Introductory Notes or translations should be returned as soon as possible.
