BOOK REVIEW

NEUROPATHOLOGY OF VISION, AN ATLAS: Richard Lindenberg, Frank B. Walsh, Joel G. Sacks, Lea & Febiger, Philadelphia, 1973. Published in Canada by The MacMillan Company of Canada, Ltd. Cloth bound, 8 x 11, 489 pages plus index, \$38.50 (Can.).

This Atlas is beautifully produced. It is a much needed addition to the armamentarium of Neuropathologists, Ophthalmologists and Neurologists with interests in Neuro-ophthalmic pathology. The illustrations are all in black and white. Facing each page of illustration, a brief history with succinct pathological findings and one or more pertinent references are provided to explain these high quality photographs. The coverage extends from the optic cup to the visual cortex and is presented in topographic order. There are eight chapters each dealing with one topical unit of the visual pathway. The presentation is quite original and as the authors themselves have put it, is in the form of a 'matching game'. However, the 'game' may sometimes be overtaxing.

The authors have condensed their vast experience into approximately 500 pages with a surprising breadth of coverage and they are to be congratulated.
