THE NEWBERRY LIBRARY WILL OBSERVE THE COLUMBIAN QUINCENTENNIAL, 1987–1988: COLUMBIAN QUINCENTENNIAL FELLOWSHIPS will be offered during the academic year 1987–88 for students working on topics related to the Transatlantic exchange of ideas, products and peoples in the period 1450–1650. Projects must be synthetic or interdisciplinary in approach, or present new fields of study for the applicant, or aim at the creation of new courses or classroom materials. Stipends of \$800 per month are offered for periods up to four months. These fellowships are offered in conjunction with Summer Institutes.

A SUMMER INSTITUTE entitled "Interdisciplinary Perspectives on Early Hispano-American Contact" will be held June 8–July 3, 1987, heralding the Columbian Quincentennial. Four courses will be offered, one each week. The topics and the instructors are: (I) "Spain on the Eve of Expansion," Geoffrey Parker (U of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign); (II) "Processes of Transatlantic Transfer," David Buisseret (Newberry L); (III) "The Aztec and Maya Encounter with Spanish Catholicism," Miguel Léon-Portilla (Ciudad Universitaria, Mexico); (IV) "The Discursive Encounter of Spain and America," Rolena Adorno (Ohio SU).
