This volume presents in English translation an extensive collection of sources for the history of the popular heresies in Western Europe during the High Middle Ages. More than seventy documents are included, ranging from the eleventh to the fourteenth century and representing both orthodox and heretical viewpoints.

The introduction sketches the characteristics of the heresies, the appearance and spread of the many sects, and the historical controversies that have arisen over their origins. It also outlines the heretics' beliefs, organization, and rites. Another section of the introduction surveys the available source materials useful in the study of the heresies and summarizes the literary activity of the heretics. An appendix lists the known antiheretical treatises by the twelfth- and thirteenth-century Catholic authors, an important source of information about the heretical movements.

Venice and the Defense of Republican Liberty

Renaissance Values in the Age of the Counter Reformation

William J. Bouwsma

Recent studies of the Italian Renaissance have emphasized the moral and cultural dimensions of republicanism, but they have been chiefly based on the experience of Florence. Italy had, however, a second great urban republic, and it is the major purpose of this book to relate Venice to the central concerns of Renaissance scholarship today. The book traces the development of the Venetian republican consciousness through a series of stages, from the relatively backward and inarticulate early Venetian Renaissance to the rich and sophisticated political and historical compositions of the later sixteenth and early seventeenth centuries. The author shows how each phase in this development corresponded

to the changing social and political circumstances of the Venetian Republic; and against this background he studies the thought of a substantial group of Venetian writers whose importance in the elaboration and transmission of Renaissance attitudes and values has been little recognized, among them Gasparo Contarini, Paolo Paruta, Enrico Davila, and Paolo Sarpi.

"Bouwsma, long familiar to students of late medieval history, brings to this study of 16th- and early 17th-century Venice a rich background in the earlier period which provides special illumination to the subject of republican ideals in the declining years of the Renaissance. . . .
