- Ten years ago the religious communities of America joined to confront injustices of our society. Today they often separately confront each other. One of the issues on which Jews and some Christians confront each other, for example, is the missionary enterprise. In the past American Jews properly regarded efforts to convert them as marginal and relatively unimportant. Today, particularly among the evangelicals, the missionary impulse is strong and Jews are reacting equally strongly. Rabbi Balfour Brickner, Director of the Department of Interreligious Affairs for the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, examines this issue and makes some clear recommendations. Incisive and provocative.
