INFORMATION FOR CONTRIBUTORS TO ANIMAL PRODUCTION

Animal Production publishes papers on original research provided that they have not been, and will not be, published elsewhere in whole, or in part, without the Editors' written permission. Contributions may be in the field of animal production, or in any related scientific field. Reports on techniques will also be considered but only as appendices to scientific papers.

Manuscripts should be typewritten in double spacing with wide margins and, preferably, the lines on each page should be numbered. Two copies of the typescript (one of illustrations) should be sent to

A.R.C. Animal Breeding Research Organisation,

6 South Oswald Road, Edinburgh 9.

Manuscripts are not returned with the proofs; authors should therefore retain copies.

Length of papers should not normally exceed the equivalent of 6,000 words, inclusive of tables, text figures and references.

Illustrations (figures and plates) should be simple and few, otherwise a charge may have to be made to authors. Legends should be typed on a separate sheet.

- (a) Diagrams should be drawn in Indian ink, about twice the size of the finished block, on Bristol board or stout tracing paper. Photographed diagrams are also accepted. Lettering inside the framework of the diagram should be inserted in Indian ink. Marginal lettering may, if preferred, be inserted lightly in pencil. Costs of touching-up diagrams found to be incomplete or unsuitable for line-block reproduction will be charged to authors.
- (b) Photographs intended for half-tone reproduction should be on glossy paper. They will be accepted only if found necessary by the Editors. Part of their cost may have to be borne by authors.
- (c) Colour plates will not be accepted unless authors bear the cost.

Tables should be as simple and as few as possible; if they are very large or numerous a charge may have to be made to authors. When constructing tables, it would be helpful if authors would take into account the size and shape of the pages of Animal Production.
