INSTRUCTIONS FOR REVIEWERS

to be read in conjunction with the general *Notes for Contributors* (see separate document)

We would be most grateful if you could take note of the instructions given below and also in the general *Instructions for Contributors*. Failure to do so makes a great deal of extra work for the Review Editor!

1. **Reviews are due no later than 5 months from the date of reception of the title to be reviewed. The standard length of a JFLS book review is in the order of 800 words.**
2. Any major deviation from the standard word length will need to be negotiated with the review editor before submission.
3. The languages of the journal are French and English; reviewers should use their first language or the one they are most comfortable with.
4. The following information should be given in the heading of reviews:
 - (a) Author(s) – surname followed by first name or initials
 - (b) Title – in italics
 - (c) Series (where applicable)
 - (d) Place of publication
 - (e) Publisher
 - (f) Date
 - (g) Number of pages
 - (h) ISBN (**without hyphens, but with spaces**) A typical heading will look like this:

Brown Jennifer and Smith D.H. (eds), *Studies in Contemporary French Syntax*. (Studies in Contemporary French, 33.) London: AFLS Press, 2014, xv + 263 pp. 0 345 678 9
5. At the end of the review please list your references (cf. main *Notes for Contributors* for details), followed by your name and address, as given below:

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For all other matters of style, please see the general *Notes for Contributors*.

6. References and footnotes should be kept to the strict minimum, and avoided altogether if at all possible.
7. Please note that no hard copies are to be submitted. A properly formatted soft copy produced in Word (doc, not docx) is sufficient and should be deposited on the ScholarOne platform (<http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/jfl>) before the agreed date.
8. You will not be asked to read proofs. The Review Editor will take on this role.
9. Authors of reviews will receive a pdf upon publication.
