GUIDELINES FOR SUBMISSION OF MANUSCRIPTS

Completed manuscripts, inquiries about material for possible publication, and correspondence to the editor should be sent to the *Journal*'s editorial offices:

Because of the multidisciplinary nature of our readership, articles in the journal, no matter how narrowly focused, should raise larger questions of interest outside the precise research specialties of their authors. Article manuscripts, including notes, should not exceed 50 pages in length. Please submit four copies. The author's name may appear on a separate title page, but not on the manuscript itself, as the *Journal of Asian Studies* engages in double-blind review of manuscripts. All submitted work should be double-spaced, including extracts, notes, and references. Consult recent issues of the *Journal* as a guide to format. Footnotes should be as few as possible and typed double-spaced at the end of the text. Documentation should follow the style recommended in sections 16.90 through 16.120 of the *Chicago Manual of Style*, 15th ed. (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2003), pp. 616–24. Authors are encouraged to submit tables, figures, maps, photographs, and other illustrations along with their manuscripts; please consult the editor for specifications. Additional guidelines on manuscript preparation are available at www.aasiansst.org.

All manuscripts submitted to the *JAS* are expected not to have been published elsewhere and not to be under review for possible publication elsewhere. Unsolicited book reviews are not accepted.
