- Jonathen Baron is Professor of Psychology at the University of Pennsylvania. His research concerns the measurement of values and the role of nonconsequentialist intuitions in decision making. He is author of *Thinking and Deciding* and teaches courses on decision making and decision analysis.
- **Giuseppe Freni** is Assistant Professor at the Maritime University Institute in Naples. His research interests include Ricardian mathematical models and the dynamics of market prices to natural prices.
- Frank Hahn is Professor Emeritus at the University of Cambridge and Professor Ordinario at the University of Siena. He is also a Fellow of Churchill College, Cambridge and of the British Academy. He is the author of numerous books and papers.
- Omar Hamouda teaches in the Economics Department of Glendon College.

He has written extensively on probability (Probability and Rational Belief (1961), The Logical Foundations of Statistical Inference (1976)), and is currently Burbank Professor of Philosophy and Computer Science at the University of Rochester.
- David Lyons recently became Professor of Law at Boston University School of Law after having taught at Cornell University for a number of years. He

- works in moral, political and legal philosophy. His writings include, Forms and Limits of Utilitarianism, Ethics and the Rule of Law, Moral Aspects of Legal Theory and Rights. Welfare, and Mill's Moral Theory.
- David Miller is Reader in Philosophy at the University of Warwick, and Secretary of the British Logic Colloquium. He is the author of Critical Rationalism. A Restatement and Defence (Open Court, 1994) and of many papers in logic and the philosophy of science. At present he is writing a book on Tarski's general metamathematics.
- Eric Rakowski is Professor of Law at the University of California at Berkeley (Boalt Hall School of Law). He is the author of *Equal Justice* (Oxford University Press, 1991), as well as articles on killing some people to save others, abortion and euthanasia.
- Neri Salvadori is Professor of Economics at the University of Pisa. He is co-author of *Theory of Production* (Cambridge University Press, 1995), co-editor of *Metroeconomica*, and is currently co-editing the *Elgar Companion to Classical Economics*. His main research interests include the theories of production, growth, and income distribution.

Books for review in *Economics and Philosophy* should be sent to Professor M. Schabas, Dept of Philosophy, York University, 4700 Keele Street, North York, Ontario, Canada M3J 1P3. Correspondence may also be sent by e-mail to: econphil@st-andrews.ac.uk.

The journal publishes papers in English only. However, the editors are willing to consider initial submissions in French, and advise the authors whether to resubmit an English version. The final decision will be made on the basis of the English version only.

Please send four copies of submitted articles, in double-spaced type. Please send any covering letter in duplicate. Include an abstract of one hundred words or fewer. We are pleased to receive copies printed on both sides of the paper. The copies sent to referees will be anonymous, so the author's name and address should appear on a separate title page and not in the rest of the article. Please also remove other clues to your identity. Repeat the title of the article at the beginning of the text to be sent to referees. Submitted articles will not be returned to authors.

Authors of accepted articles will be asked to prepare a final version in the journal's style, following instructions that the editors will provide, and to submit it on disk together with a version on paper.

Submitting an article to *Economics and Philosophy* implies that it has not been published elsewhere and is not being considered for publication elsewhere. Authors must obtain written permission to publish any material for which they do not own the copyright. They will be asked to assign the copyright of their article, under certain conditions, to Cambridge University Press. Authors of articles will receive 25 offprints of their article free of charge; additional copies may be purchased if ordered at proof stage on the form provided. (In the case of joint contributions, offprints will be sent to the first named author unless otherwise requested.)
