The Spring 1972 issue will be a special number devoted to the role of international organizations in the global environmental crisis. The issue will be directly relevant to the proceedings of the UN Conference on the Human Evironment, to be held in Stockholm in June, and many contributors to this issue will be participants at the Stockholm conference.

You will, of course, receive this special issue as part of your regular subscription. However, the editors, in cooperation with the University of Wisconsin Press, have arranged to publish this issue in book form, as well, in order to give it the widest possible circulation before the beginning of the Stockholm conference.

The resulting book—World Eco-Crisis: International Organizations in Response—will be published on June 5, the date of the opening of the conference, but will be available for distribution about six weeks prior to that date. It will be published simultaneously in cloth and paper editions, at \$12.50 and \$2.50 respectively.

Man in the Living Environment A Report on Global Ecological Problems

This report, the work of fifty top-ranking scientists, was prepared to transmit the ecologist's view of global ecological problems to the 1972 UN Conference on the Human Environment. It was patterned after the Study of Critical Environmental Problems (SCEP) which was sponsored by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and published in the report, "Man's Impact on the Global Environment." The ecological section of that report was the starting point for this conference.

Man in the Living Environment is divided into five chapters representing the major findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the four workshop task groups which met in June 1971 under the sponsorship of the Institute of Ecology. The chapters—Ecology of the Human Population; Cycles of Elements; Ecosystems for Human Benefit; Ecological Aspects of Land Management; and Management of Aquatic Resources—discuss a wide range of problems, including those concerning population and resources management, pollution, chemical and biological pest control, crop and habitat management, land and aquatic food sources, eutrophication of land and water, and the effects of human activity upon element cycles.

Man in the Living Environment will be an important document in appreciating the proceedings of the UN Stockholm Conference, and will long serve as a guide to understanding the complex problems that man has brought upon his world environment.


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
