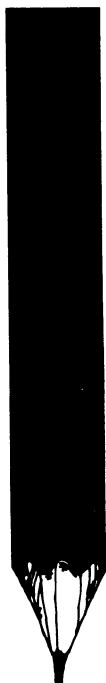

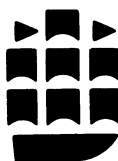

TWO POLICY PERIODICALS FOR THE PRICE OF ONE

Starting in June or September, 1981, the Policy Studies Organization will publish two periodicals. One will be the *Policy Studies Journal* and the other will be the *Policy Studies Review*. Each periodical will be a quarterly with about one special issue per year, meaning a combination of about ten issues per year. Each regular issue will be over 150 pages, meaning a combination of about 1,500 PAGES per year. Both periodicals will be received for the price of a \$12 subscription to the *Policy Studies Journal*.

The general PURPOSE of both periodicals is to show how political and social science can be relevant to important policy problems. Nearly all the issues are "special" in the sense of containing specially-funded symposia. The regular quarterly issues also contain non-symposium articles, literature reviews, and organization/journal developments.

The *Policy Studies Journal* will be coordinated by Stuart Nagel of the University of Illinois, and the *Policy Studies Review* will be coordinated by Dennis Palumbo of the University of Kansas. The *PSR* will especially emphasize symposia related to implementation and evaluation, and *PSJ* will emphasize a more varied approach to policy studies. The *PSR* will also emphasize a more interdisciplinary orientation, while *PSJ* will place relatively more emphasis on political science.

Individuals wishing to subscribe to both periodicals for one year should send a check for ONLY \$12 to the Policy Studies Organization, 361 Lincoln Hall, University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois 61801. For a two-year subscription, there is a 10% discount, bringing the second-year cost down to \$10.80; and for a three-year subscription, there is a 15% discount, bringing the third-year cost down to \$10.20. Invoices can be provided. The ten issues bought individually would be \$3 apiece to individuals and \$5 apiece to libraries, or \$30 and \$50 per year or volume, rather than \$12 on an individual subscription basis.

In addition to the ten issues per year, new subscribers are entitled to receive free any two of the six PSO directories dealing with policy studies among government agencies, teaching programs, funding sources, research centers, individual researchers, and publishers/associations. Those directories individually sell for \$3 apiece to individuals and \$5 apiece to libraries. There are generally one or more new FREE DIRECTORIES each year. PSO members are also entitled to approximately one-third BOOK DISCOUNTS on all 40 volumes in the PSO series of Lexington Books and the 10 volumes in the PSO Yearbooks in Politics and Public Policy of Sage Publications.

PSO journal symposia and the books which have resulted from them have been REVIEWED FAVORABLY in the *American Political Science Review*, *Perspective*, *Choice*, and elsewhere. Contributors of articles (as well as subscribers) are welcomed. Subscribing to *PSJ* and *PSR* also makes one a member of an organization working to promote the application of political and social science to important policy problems.
