For the World's Poultry Science Journal there is a similar objective – that of publishing reviews from a widening range of countries. It is therefore pleasing to report that in this issue two papers are published from countries which, to the best of the Editor's knowledge, have not previously contributed to the journal. These are: Possibilities for preventing mycotoxicosis in domestic fowl by K.H. Nahm from the Korean Republic and Poultry production in Ethiopia by Alemu Yami from Ethiopia.

By now many readers should already have 2–8 September 1996 and New Delhi, India firmly in their plans for next year. Included under Association News (page 237) is part of an address by Dr B.V. Rao, the President of the WPSA Indian Branch and some details from the Branch Secretary, Dr B.S. Sathe, of the arrangements for the XXth World's Poultry Congress and International Exhibition. It is good to report that the programme is taking firm shape and that the venue for the Congress will be the India Habitat Centre, New Delhi, which is

a fine modern complex currently nearing completion.

It is the Editor's hope that this issue will have reached readers reasonably close to the publication month shown on the cover. In the case of the March issue, a calamity added over a month's delay when 124 pages of film, representing the full contents, were lost by the courier service between the UK and Mount Morris, USA. When trying very hard to re-establish a proper publication schedule, such setbacks are particularly frustrating for those concerned with journal production, as well as for readers.
