## British Politics Group's Samuel H. Beer Dissertation Prize and Dissertation Fellowship Award

Warren Fishbein has been awarded the Samuel H. Beer Dissertation Prize for his dissertation, "Wage Restraint by Consensus: British Attempts to Mobilize Trade Union Support for Income Policy, 1965-79," written at Massachusetts Institute of Technology under the direction of Suzanne Berger. This prize is awarded by the British Politics Group and is intended to stimulate interest in the study of British politics among graduate students, thereby helping to develop a new generation of scholars in the British field. The prize is awarded each year to the dissertation making the most outstanding contribution to the understanding of British politics, whether that understand-

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ing derives from exclusively British research or from a comparative study. The monetary value of the award is L125. **Bingham Powell** chaired the prize committee. The other members of the prize committee were **James Christoph** and **Kenneth Wald.** 

Nominations for the 1983 award are now being received. Any dissertation dealing in whole or in part with British politics which was completed during the calendar years 1980, 1981, or 1982 is eligible. Only a supervising professor may nominate a dissertation and each professor is limited to a single nomination. A copy of the nominated dissertation, along with a brief letter of nomination, should be sent to the Executive Secretary of the British Politics Group, 503 Ross Hall, lowa State University, Ames, Iowa 50011.

Fishbein was the fifth recipient of the Beer Dissertation Prize. The other prize, the Dissertation Fellowship Award, was presented for the first time this year. This award was intended to enable a doctoral candidate who otherwise would be unable to go to Britain for field research to do so.

The winner of the Dissertation Fellowship Award, selected by the committee of **Gerald Dorfman**, chair, **Philip Norton**, and **Hugh Stephens** was **William Beattie Smith**. Smith's dissertation, which deals with the attempts to devise a workable governmental structure for Northern Ireland, is being written under the supervision of **John Chubb** of Stanford University. In keeping with the purpose of enabling a student to travel to Britain, the monetary value of this award was L1000.

### **Council on Foreign Relations International Affairs Fellows**

The Council on Foreign Relations has announced the appointment of 16 International Affairs Fellows for 1982-83. Now in its seventeenth year, the program offers young foreign policy professionals from the private sector experience in a policy oriented environment within a

**Samuel H. Kernell** of the University of California, San Diego, was awarded a Na-




American law and justice. The 1982 competition attracted 458 entries. Fifteen Silver Gavels, including four for books, were awarded to various media entries.
