#### New publications

The project team working on the Clinical Practice Guidelines (CPG) Programme at the College Research Unit will later this Spring launch the programme's first guidelines, Management of Imminent Violence – Clinical Practice Guidelines to Support Mental Health Services. A new title from the College Seminars Series, entitled Seminars in General Adult Psychiatry edited by George Stein and Greg Wilkinson, has now been published by Gaskell/The Royal College of Psychiatrists. The book places its emphasis on detailed clinical descriptions of the common psychiatric disorders and their place within the ICD-10 and DSM-IV schemes and will be of particular interest to those preparing for their MRCPsych examinations. The Bereavement Information Pack for Those Bereaved Through Suicide or Other Sudden Death has now been published by Gaskell/The Royal College of Psychiatrists. Developed because of the need for a source of information and advice for bereaved individuals, the original work was largely the responsibility of the late Kate Hill, a research worker, who used her considerable experience of suicide and the bereaved to develop this information source. During a course of investigations, 84% of individuals given the pack, reported finding it of benefit. It is now available from the Publications Department of the College for £5.

The Health and Safety Commission has recently published new guidance on violence in health services in response to a dramatic rise in the number of work-related incidents.
