

Programmed by a psychiatrist and a professional programmer, it is a low-cost (non-profit-making), fully-featured mental health information system to meet the needs of multidisciplinary adult psychiatric services in the 1990's. It can be used on a single PC or a network, runs under either MS-DOS® or Unix/386Xenix®, and employs the most recent upgrade of dBase IV®, of which a runtime package is supplied with the MS-DOS version.

SafetyNet provides

- a comprehensive database with date and time archiving, readily adaptable to a wide variety of services and clinical needs;
- a simple and inexpensive development path for evolving services, using state-of-the-art, industry-standard components;
- easy data entry and retrieval, by means of standard and userconfigured codes, extensive optional free-text areas, a wide choice of reports and ability to use a portable barcode reader.

SafetyNet is designed to promote the coordination of services, improvements in allocation of resources and the facilitation of research, within a framework of evolving policies for communityoriented mental health services and for medical audit, aftercare registration and resource management.

SafetyNet Version 2.01 is now available, offering both DSM-III-R and ICD9 diagnoses, greatly enhanced reports and free-text entry (providing a complete alternative to written case-notes), and popup facilities including staff diaries, reminders, calculator, and manual. ICD10 is now being added, and further refinements, including an outpatient booking module and resource management functions, will shortly be available.
