THE CONTRIBUTORS

EVAN LUARD, formerly a member of the British Foreign Service, is now a Research Fellow of St. Antony's College, Oxford, where he works in the field of international relations. He is the author of *Peace and Opinion* (1962) and *Nationality and Wealth* (in press), both of which are studies of means of strengthening the existing procedures and structure of the United Nations.

YOUNG C. KIM, Associate Professor of Political Science at Hobart and William Smith Colleges, is engaged in an empirical investigation of the correlates of political orientations in New York as part of a cross-national study encompassing the United States and Japan.

BERNARD K. GORDON is Assistant Professor of Political Science at Vanderbilt University. On leave with the Institute for Defense Analyses during the past academic year, he made two trips to Southeast Asia and plans to return to the field late in 1964 under a Rockefeller Foundation grant. His publications include *New Zealand Becomes a Pacific Power* (1960).

LYNN H. MILLER is a graduate student in the Department of Politics at Princeton University.

DAVIS B. BOBROW, Assistant Professor of Politics and Research Associate of the Center of International Studies at Princeton University, is working on an analysis of the Chinese Communist military in nation-building.

KLAUS EPSTEIN, Professor of History at Brown University, is the author of *Erzberger and the Dilemma of German Democracy* (1959). His history of German conservatism from Möser to Metternich is nearing completion.

ARTHUR I. WASKOW is Peace Research Institute Fellow of the Institute for Policy Studies in Washington, D.C. He has written *The Limits of Defense* (1962) and *The Worried Man's Guide to World Peace* (1963).

MICHAEL BROWER teaches American political economy as an Instructor in the School of Industrial Management at M.I.T. He is preparing a study of American atomic-military policy from 1939 to 1949 for a Ph.D. degree from Harvard University.

FELIX E. OPPENHEIM, Professor of Government at the University of Massachusetts, is also serving during the current academic year as Visiting Professor of Political Science at Amherst College. The author of *Dimensions of Freedom* (1961), shortly to be published in Italian translation, he is now working on a book tentatively entitled *Theories of Politics: A Systematic Approach*.
