Please include with your submission your full contact information, including your email address.

The editors ask that submissions be presented in a manner that facilitates the work of reviewing and editing. Please submit a digital version of your work by email attachment to: [hist-cssh@umich.edu](mailto:hist-cssh@umich.edu), or on a CD. No printed copies are required. The journal works in Microsoft Word. The journal uses Windows-based PCs exclusively: Materials formatted for Macintosh, Linux, or other operating systems will only be accepted by prior arrangement. The work should be formatted in 12-point type and double-spaced throughout, including quotations, notes, and bibliography. Please allow generous margins of an inch or more for editorial corrections. Authors of essays accepted for publication must secure and submit permissions to reproduce photographs or other illustrations and tables as well.
