





QUALIFICATIONS: Applications are welcome from political scientists who have completed a PhD in the last 15 years or will have defended a dissertation in political science by November 2018. Candidates must be US citizens or permanent residents. The program is open to scholars in all subfields of political science who can show a scholarly interest in Congress and the policymaking process.

FELLOWSHIP YEAR: Orientation begins in November 2018. Office assignments run until August 15, 2019. Two optional programs precede the main fellowship year. Candidates may apply to take a course on Congress and Foreign Policy taught in September and October 2018, as well as apply for a fellowship through the William A. Steiger Fund to spend up to two months at the APSA Centennial Center carrying out a project in legislative studies.

STIPEND: \$50,000 for the 9.5-month fellowship period, plus a travel allowance.

SELECTION: Preference is given to those who have not had extensive Capitol Hill experience.

APPLICATION PROCEDURE: The application period opens in September 2017, and applications are due <u>December 5, 2017</u>. Applications must be submitted online and include:

- a detailed CV
- a 500-word personal statement explaining how the fellowship relates to professional goals
- the names and contact information for three professional references who have agreed to write letters of recommendation
- a writing sample
