TREATMENT OF MIXED SALIVARY TUMOURS

I have read with interest the article under this heading by Van Miert, Dawes and Harkness (J.L.O.), May 1968, p. 459) and agree that the implantation of radioactive materials is an excellent technique for these cases.

The ascription of credit for techniques is always difficult and these authors mention Todd as having described in 1944 the implantation of Radium at operation after local removal of tumour. However, had Dr. van Miert lived long enough to have been concerned with the final text of the article bearing his name, I feel sure that he would have given credit where this was due, namely to Dr. Frank Ellis of Oxford.

The latter established the implantation technique as a sound procedure and Dr. van Miert learned how to carry it out while working with him.

A copy of the syllabus giving full information about the teaching and research facilities provided by the Institute, and a detailed programme of any of the courses listed overleaf and of the short courses on specific aspects which are arranged from time to time can be obtained from the Secretary Administrator.

The clinical practice can be joined at any time by individual arrangemen with the Dean. This includes daily practical teaching in the clinics and operating theatres and ward-rounds and special demonstrations weekly.

A tuition fee of \$300, payable at the time of application in U.S. currency, the Los Angeles Foundation of Otology, includes the cost of the noon incheons.

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
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Applications from residents in otolaryngology will be accepted upon receipt f a letter of recommendation by their Chief of Service. The fee for residents \$100.
