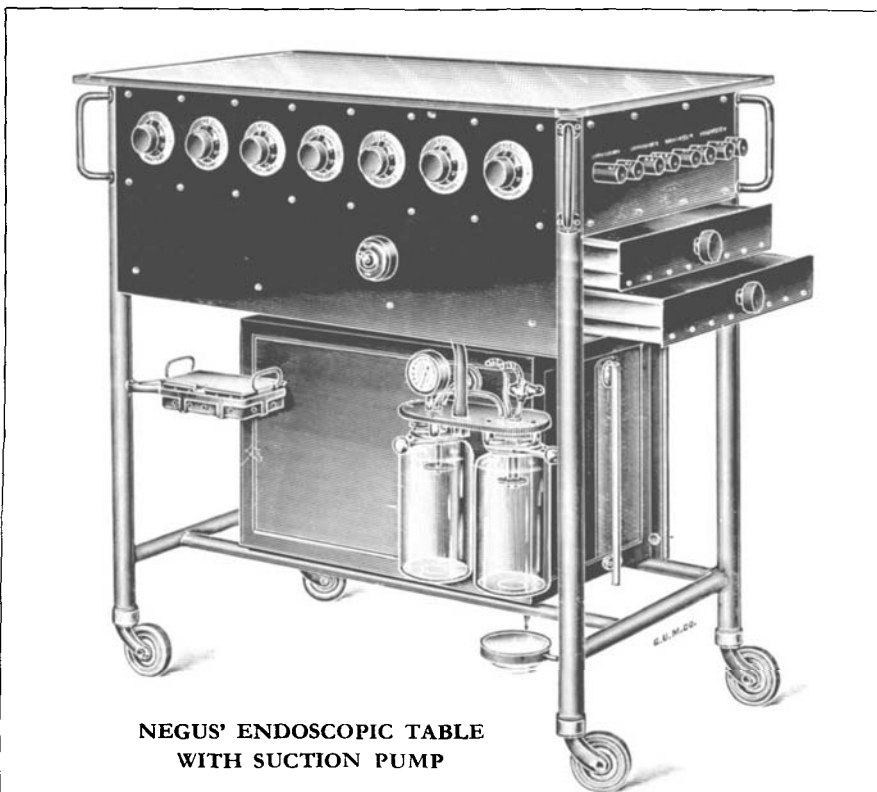

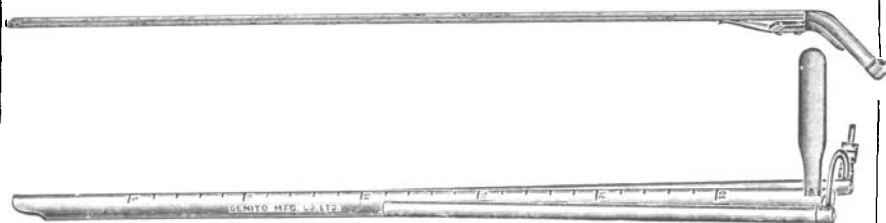

Planacrine in Laryngology
