Ostensibly a rationale for Legalist totalitarian control, *The Art of Rulership* more nearly expounds a form of practicable Taoism, setting forth a political structure conducive to the advancement of Taoist and Confucian precepts at a practical social level.

The Art of Rulership sheds light on cultural elements that go far beyond the concerns of this investigation, making it of value to students of Chinese culture regardless of discipline.
