The Harvard University Graduate School of Business Administration and The Newcomen Society in North America announce a postdoctoral fellowship in business history for approximately \$22,000 for twelve-months' residence, study, and research at the Harvard Business School, for the academic year 1983–1984. The Newcomen Fellowship in Business History represents \$9000 of this award, and the remainder of the Fellowship and its associated expenses will be covered by a grant from the Harvard Business School. The Fellow may begin the twelve-months' residence on either July 1 or September 1, 1983.

The purpose of this award is to assist scholars who have, within the past ten years, received their Ph.D. in history, economics, or a related discipline to improve their professional acquaintance with business and economic history, to increase their skills as they relate to this field, and to engage in research that will benefit from the resources of the Harvard Business School and the Boston scholarly community. The successful applicant will be asked to participate in the School's Business History course, seminar, and case development activities.

Applicants should state their purpose in applying for the Fellowship, and the topic, objectives, and design for the research to be undertaken. Applications should be accompanied by graduate school records, thesis abstract, names and addresses of three persons who will support the application, and such other evidence as the applicant wishes to submit.

Applications for the Postdoctoral Fellowship in Business History must be submitted before March 1, 1983, addressed to Professor Alfred D. Chandler, Jr., Baker 214, Harvard Business School, Soldiers Field, Boston, Massachusetts 02163. The Fellowship will be awarded and all applicants notified by March 15, 1983. Material submitted with applications will be returned only if accompanied by postage and self-addressed return envelope.

The Lincoln Educational Foundation will award three John E. Rovensky pre-doctoral fellowships in American economic and business history, in the amount of \$3000 each, for the academic year, 1983–1984. Applicants must be citizens of the United States or Canada and be planning to acquire a Ph.D. degree with either American economic history or American business history as the area of major interest. Those who have demonstrated capacity to pursue graduate work successfully for one year will have an advantage over those who are just beginning graduate study. Study is normally to be done at an approved institution in the United States, and preference will be given to applicants who are preparing for careers in teaching and research. Applications must be submitted not later than February 1, 1983, to C. Clyde Jones, College of Business Administration, Kansas State University, Manhattan, Kansas 66502.

The Eleutherian Mills-Hagley Foundation and the History Department at the University of Delaware are jointly sponsoring the Hagley Program in the History of Industrial America. The academic focus of the Hagley graduate program is on the social history of American industrialization. Hagley fellows study the context and consequences of economic and technological change within a wide-ranging history curriculum. Emphasis is placed on the impact industrialization has made on the daily lives of American workers. The two-year master of arts degree leads to careers in museums and historical agencies; the four-year Ph.D. program prepares college teachers.

Full tuition and a small travel fund are provided. In addition to the yearly stipend of \$4,200 for the first two years and \$4,600 for the second two years, an allowance of \$1,200 is available to married students with dependent children. These awards are renewable for one year beyond the initial year for M.A. candidates and for three years beyond the initial year for those pursuing the Ph.D. Deadline for application is February 1, 1983 for the 1983–84 academic year. 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The Indiana Historical Society intends to offer two \$3,500 graduate fellowships for the 1983–1984 academic year to doctoral candidates whose dissertations are in the fields of Indiana history or of Indiana and the regions of which the state is traditionally a part, the Old Northwest and Midwest. 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The New York State Historical Association is receiving manuscripts for the 1983 New York State Historical Association Manuscript Award. Established in 1973, the award consists of a \$1,000 prize and assistance in publication, presented each year to the best unpublished, book-length monograph dealing with the history of New York State, as judged by a special editorial committee. Manuscripts may deal with any aspect of New York State history. Biographies of individuals whose careers illuminate aspects of the history of the state are eligible, as are manuscripts dealing with such cultural matters as literature and the arts, provided that in such cases the methodology is historical. Works of fiction and works of article length are not eligible. The deadline is February 1, 1983. Manuscripts and requests for information should be addressed to Dr. Wendell Tripp, New York State Historical Association, Cooperstown, New York 13326-0800.

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Applications for designation as the first "Fischelis Scholar" are now being received by the American Institute of the History of Pharmacy. Periodic competition for this appointment is planned to stimulate research and other socio-

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historical work related to American trends and issues of recent decades that have had an impact on the practice of pharmacy. Eligible subjects include not only conditions of practice, but also such areas as organizational affairs, educational policies and standards, economic factors, and developments in the field of public health, as these relate to the work of pharmacists. Prospective applicants may obtain information and instructions upon request to the American Institute of the History of Pharmacy, Pharmacy Building, Madison, Wisconsin 53706. The person appointed will carry the honorific title of "Fischelis Scholar" for a period to be negotiated (ordinarily a year or more) and receive a grant of up to \$3,500 in partial support of the recipient's project. The deadline for receipt of applications is April 1, 1983. The Institute points out that applicants need not be associated with a university or with a particular occupation.
