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Aaron Wildavsky Nominated To Be APSA President-Elect

Aaron Wildavsky, University of California, Berkeley, has been nominated president-elect of APSA for 1984-85. He would automatically become APSA's president the subsequent year under the Association's constitution. The nomination was made by the 1984 Nominating Committee which was appointed by Association president Philip E. Converse and past president William Riker.

The Nominating Committee also slated three vice-presidential nominees, Robert Gilpin, Princeton University; Samuel P. Huntington, Harvard University; and Donna E. Shalala, Hunter College, CUNY. Robert Axelrod, University of Michigan, is nominated to be secretary for 1984-85.

Eight new members of the 16-member Council were also nominated by the committee to serve a two-year term (1984-86). These nominees are: Brian Barry, California Institute of Technology; F. Chris Garcia, University of New Mexico; William R. Keech, University of North Carolina; J. Donald Moon, Wesleyan University; Victor Olorunsola, Iowa State University; Norman J. Ornstein, American Enterprise Institute; Benjamin I. Page, University of Texas at Austin; and Bruce Russett, Yale University.

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Under APSA's constitution the preceding nominations are subject to the vote of those members of the Association attending the Annual Business Meeting. If there is a contest for any elected office, an election will be conducted by mail ballot. Ballots will be distributed within 30 days of the Annual Business Meeting by the executive director. They must be returned within the 30 days following distribution.

The 1984 Annual Business Meeting rules

and the constitution are printed in the Spring 1984 issue of PS on pp. 331-342. The rules require that any nominations in addition to those made by the Nominating Committee must be received in writing at the Association's Washington office prior to Monday, August 27, 1984 or thereafter at the Association's annual meeting office in the hotel headquarters. All such nominations and certifications must be received at least 24 hours before the session of the Annual Business Meeting in order to include those names on the original nominating document. Specific procedures for offering nominations are indicated in the Annual Business Meeting Rules.

Members of the 1984 Nominating Committee are: Elinor Ostrom, Indiana University, chair; Fred Greenstein, Princeton University; A. F. K. Organski, University of Michigan; Robert D. Putnam, Harvard University; Kenneth Shepsle, Washington University; and Judith Stiehm, University of Southern California.

The current president-elect of APSA is Richard F. Fenno, Jr., University of Rochester. He will become president of the Association after the 1984 Annual Meeting in September. Susan Welch, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, will serve her second year of her two-year term as treasurer in 1984-85.

Herbert A. Simon To Receive Madison Award

Herbert A. Simon, professor of computer science and psychology at Carnegie-Mellon University, has been chosen to receive the highest accolade of the Association, the James Madison Award, given to a living American political scientist who has made a distinguished scholarly contribution to political science.

The Madison Award, which carries a cash prize of \$2,000, is presented every three years. Previous winners were Robert Dahl in 1978 and Gabriel Almond in 1981. The recipient is asked to deliver the Madison lecture at the Association's annual meeting, scheduled for Friday, August 31, at 5:30 p.m. in the Washington Hilton Hotel. In addition, a citation will be presented at the Thursday evening awards ceremony.
