
The Blue-Eyed Enemy

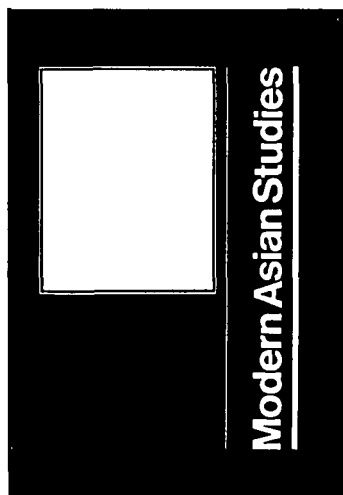

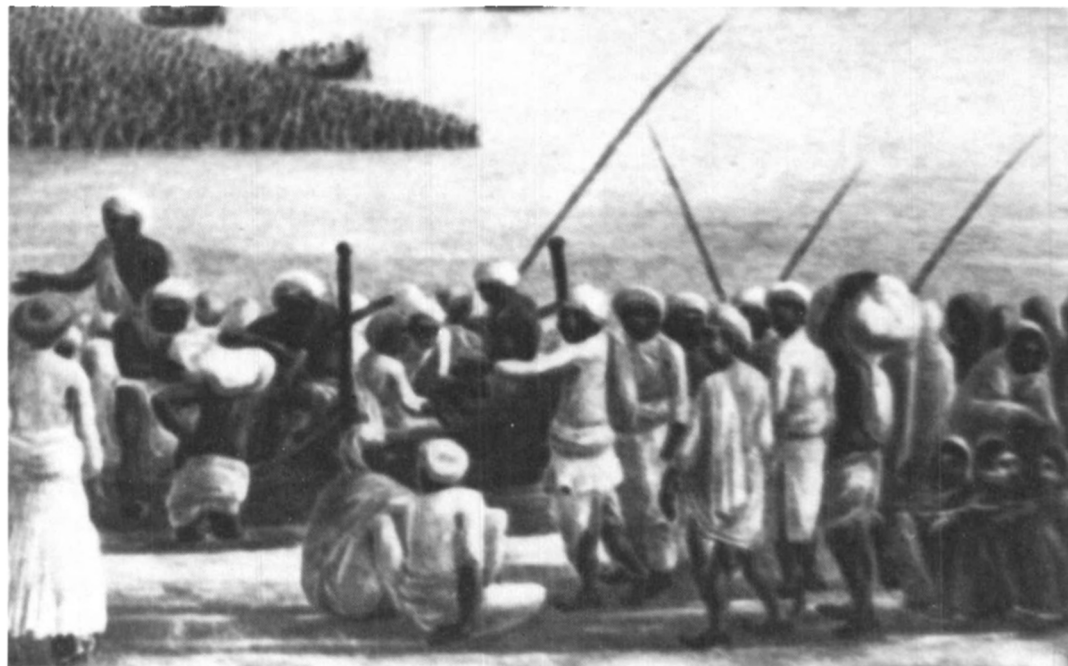

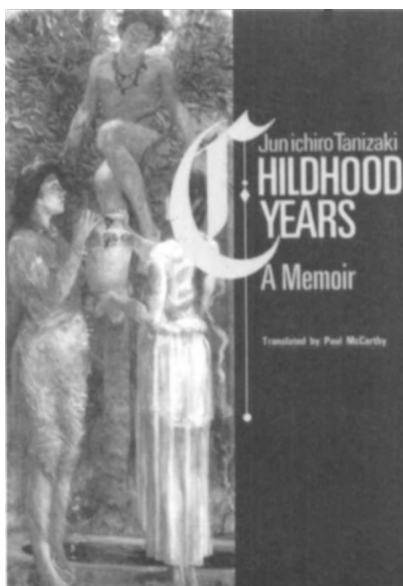
Available for the first time in English, *CHILDHOOD YEARS: A MEMOIR* is the newly published autobiography of Jun'ichiro Tanizaki. Tanizaki (1866–1965) was one of the giants of twentieth-century Japanese literature with a career that spanned three modern imperial eras: Meiji, Taisho, and Showa. His best-known book to the American audience, *THE MAKIOKA SISTERS*, has entertained more foreign readers than any other Japanese novel.

CHILDHOOD YEARS is both an intense personal memoir and a rare record of an age that no longer exists. Readers of Tanizaki's work will recognize in this memoir echoes of Tanizaki's literary concerns. In particular, *CHILDHOOD YEARS* presents the central figure of Tanizaki's mother, the prototype of his continued obsession with the female figure as both nurturing and cruel.

CHILDHOOD YEARS also gives a vivid portrait of a rapidly disappearing Old Japan as it was at the turn of the century—the small merchant lifestyle with its extended families, cramped and yet elegant homes, daily bath rituals and visits to the theatre and seaside resorts. *CHILDHOOD YEARS* opens a window for Western readers into the worlds of sacred *kagura* dancers and burlesque *chaban*. The evolution of Japanese literature is also represented, from age-old, legendary chronicles to medieval warrior tales and on to the political novel of the twentieth century.

Paul McCarthy's translation captures both Tanizaki's Proustian flow and his flashes of dark humor and delight in the grotesque, creating a memoir of great power and compelling texture.
