The Contributors

Edward H. Buehrig is Associate Professor of Government at Indiana University. He was a member of the United States Delegation at San Francisco and at the United Nations session in London. He served as Senior Secretary to the Commission of Experts for the Investigation of the Italo-Yugoslav Boundary.

Stephen D. Kertesz is Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Notre Dame. He was Secretary-General of the Hungarian Peace Delegation at the Conference of Paris in 1946 and subsequently was Hungarian Minister to Italy.

Jacob J. Kaplan was until October 1, 1950, when he returned to government service, Research Associate in the Yale Institute of International Studies. He was formerly in the Department of State as Chief of the Division of Economic Research on Southern Europe.

Janet Besse was an Assistant in Research in the Yale Institute of International Studies during the period of her collaboration with Harold D. Lasswell. Mr. Lasswell is Professor of Law at Yale University. His publications include Psychopathology and Politics, World Politics and Personal Insecurity, and The Language of Politics: Studies in Quantitative Semantics (with Nathan Leites and associates).

Adolf Sturmthal is Professor of Economics at Bard College. He has just returned from Europe after a year of research under grants of the Social Science Research Council and the Fulbright Administration. His last major book was The Tragedy of European Labor 1918-1939.

Raymond L. Garthoff is a student of Soviet and Russian affairs on the staff of the Social Science Division of The RAND Corporation.

John Gange is Director of the Woodrow Wilson School of Foreign Affairs at the University of Virginia. He has taught at Princeton and Stanford and has been on the staff of the Brookings Institution. He has been Executive Secretary of the United States Section of the Anglo-American Caribbean Commission and has served with the ECA.

Henry W. Ehrmann, Professor of Political Science at the University of Colorado, is at present a member of the Seminar on Modern France, organized under the auspices of the Institute for Advanced Study. His publications on contemporary France include French Labor: From Popular Front to Liberation.
