




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ReCALL

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Editorial

If this issue of *ReCALL* has landed on your desk much later than you would have expected, apologies all round. I am sure that if you read the report beginning on page 29, you will appreciate that the workload in the CTICML office has increased considerably over recent months, since the advent of the Teaching and Learning Technology Programme (TLTP). In addition, the office has been re-located in more spacious premises in the Language Centre at the University of Hull, which has involved some communication problems as we await connection to the new campus network.

The good news is that the new Higher Education Funding Council has agreed to fund CTI Centres until March 1994, with discussions pending on future provision. We are currently in the process of appointing an Information Officer and a full-time secretary, so that from January 1993 we hope to be able to cover both CTICML and TLTP work more efficiently and at a slightly less frantic pace.

Two of the articles in this issue of ReCALL focus on courseware design issues: both discuss applications for the Apple Macintosh, but the emphasis on practical classroom teaching and on human-computer interface is universal. Peter Dayan's article on the development of the use of French word processing is a timely follow-up to Michael Glencross's article in the May issue of ReCALL, and we also have two mildly provocative pieces on approaches to language teaching in relation to CALL.

For those who are considering submitting papers for Eurocall 93, a final reminder that the deadline for abstracts is 31 January 1993. Full details are available from the address on this page.


