

Information for Authors

The purpose of the *Canadian Journal of Philosophy* is the publication in Canada of international philosophical work of high quality, in English or French, in any field of philosophy. All submissions are given blind editorial review. As many submissions as possible are sent to external referees, with a response to authors within six months of submission. When submissions are not sent for external refereeing, *CJP* endeavours to respond to authors within three months.

Submissions may be sent to the Executive Secretary at cjp@uleth.ca in either Word or WordPerfect. Where submissions contain symbols or Greek letters, PDF files are preferable. Manuscripts should be double-spaced, including quotes and footnotes, in a standard (e.g., 12 point) font. *CJP* will not normally consider manuscripts longer than 10,000 words. Footnotes should be numbered consecutively and placed at the bottom of each page. The Journal follows *The University of Chicago Manual of Style*. Manuscripts should be prepared for blind review, which means they should contain no self-identifying references in either text or footnotes. An abstract of 150 to 250 words should also be included.

Authors will receive, without charge, 25 copies of their articles. Additional offprints may be ordered when the proofs are returned to the publisher.

Toutes les soumissions sont évaluées à l'aveugle par le comité éditorial. La plupart des soumissions sont envoyées à des évaluateurs externes. Dans la mesure du possible, les auteurs sont avisés de la décision dans les six mois suivant la soumission. Si toutefois les manuscrits contiennent des symboles ou des lettres grecques, il est alors préférable d'utiliser le format PDF. Les manuscrits doivent être rédigés à double interligne, y compris les citations et les notes, en utilisant un caractère de taille normale (soit de 12). Normalement, le CJP ne considérera pas les manuscrits excédant les 10,000 mots. Les notes doivent être numérotées de manière consécutive et se trouver au bas de chaque page. Le Journal se conforme au *The University of Chicago Manual of Style*. De plus, les manuscrits doivent être préparés pour être évalués à l'aveugle et ne doivent pas contenir de référence permettant l'identification de l'auteur dans le texte ou dans les notes. Veuillez aussi inclure un résumé de 150 à 250 mots.

Les auteurs recevront gratuitement 25 tirés-à-part de leur article. S'ils désirent en obtenir un plus grand nombre, ils sont priés d'en informer l'imprimeur lors du renvoi des épreuves.



ABOUT THE BOOK

Can emotions be rational or are they necessarily irrational? Are emotions universally shared states? Or are they socio-cultural constructions? Are emotions perceptions of some kind? Since the publication of Jerry Fodor's *The Modularity of Mind* (1983), a new question about the philosophy of emotions has emerged: Are emotions modular? A positive answer to this question would mean, minimally, that emotions are cognitive capacities that can be explained in terms of mental components that are functionally dissociable from other parts of the mind. But depending on the kind of modules that are considered, be they Chomskyan, Fodorian, Darwinian, and so on, the answer to this question might well be different. The twelve new essays in this volume address the question of whether emotions, or at least some of them, are, in some sense of the word, modules, and explore how this could potentially influence our understanding of emotional phenomena.

ABOUT THE EDITORS

Christine Tappolet is the Canada Research Chair in Ethics and Meta-ethics and an associate professor in the Department of Philosophy at the Université de Montréal. She is the author of *Émotions et Valeurs* (2000) and the co-author, with Ruwen Ogien, of *Les Concepts de l'éthique* (2008) and of several articles in meta-ethics, moral psychology and the philosophy of emotions.

Luc Faucher is an associate professor in the Department of Philosophy at the Université du Québec à Montréal. He has published many papers on emotions, racial cognition and evolutionary psychology. In 2006, he edited a volume of Philosophiques on philosophy and psychopathologies.



ABOUT THE BOOK

Defining the principles of justice that ought to govern the global economic and political sphere is one of the most urgent tasks that contemporary political philosophers face. But they must also contribute to working through the institutional implications of these principles. How might principles of global justice be realized? Must the institutions that aim to implement them be transnational, or can global justice be attained within the context of the state system? Can institutions of democratic self-governance be imagined beyond the nation-state? These are just some of the questions that still face political philosophers even when issues of abstract principle have been addressed.

This volume establishes a dialogue between philosophers working at all levels of abstraction. Some of the authors are concerned with the grounds and scope of the obligations that bind the citizens and governments of rich countries to those of poorer nations. But many examine the question of how these obligations can be satisfied, both within existing institutional frameworks and beyond. Together their essays constitute a major contributon to the advancement of both the theoretical understanding and the practical requirements of global justice.

Daniel Weinstock holds the Canada Research Chair in Ethics and Political Philosophy in the Department of Philosophy of the University of Montreal. He is also the Founding Director of the Centre de recherche en éthique de l'Université de Montréal. He has written extensively on a wide range of issues in political philosophy, including democratic theory, multiculturalism and global justice. He was awarded the Pierre-Elliott-Trudeau Prize in 2004, and the André-Laurendeau Prize in 2006.





A traditional task of epistemology is to



establish and defend systematic standards that must be met in order for us to have knowledge or justified beliefs. A naturalized epistemology tries to arrive at such standards through an empirical investigation into how we interact with our fellows and the world around us, what we seek in these activities, and the particular ways in which we can and cannot succeed. This approach is a radical departure from tradition because its means of investigation is empirical.





Call for Papers: 'Retributive Emotions'

Special issue of *Philosophical Papers*Guest editor: Lucy Allais (Witwatersrand & Sussex)

Reactive attitudes are affective ways of viewing agents in response to the good or bad will that they demonstrate in their actions; retributive reactive attitudes, such as resentment, indignation, guilt, and contempt, are the subset of reactive attitudes that involve seeing the agent to whom they are directed as having done wrong. Philosophers have both defended and criticised the moral value of retributive reactive attitudes. Defenders have explored their intimate connections with self-respect, resistance to injustice, accountability, agency, and personhood, and some philosophers argue we cannot understand responsibility without these emotions. At the same time, both in philosophy and in popular culture it is often thought that dissolving or overcoming retributive emotions is both healthy and virtuous. Both views raise complex questions about the nature of retributive reactive attitudes. The aim of this special issue of Philosophical Papers is to explore this area, and with it, the complex role that the moral emotions play in our understanding of wrongdoing.

Possible topics for discussion include:

- Analyses of particular retributive attitudes.
- The intentional content of the retributive emotions.
- The significance and role of the 'feeling' part of retributive attitudes.
- The relation between retributive emotions and moral judgments.
- The relation between, on the one hand, having a particular emotional response to wrongdoing and, on the other hand, 'properly' grasping the wrongness of the wrong and the perpetrator's culpability and 'properly' condemning this wrong.
- The relationship between retributive emotions and responsibility.
- The relationship between retributive emotions and punishment.
- The relationship between retributive emotions and forgiveness.
- The rational or moral culpability in not having retributive emotional responses, and whether there are differences between self-directed and other-directed retributive responses.
- The extent to which the retributive emotions are optional or avoidable.
- The possibility of having 'positive' reactive attitudes (e.g., gratitude) without having retributive attitudes.

The deadline for receipt of submission is 30 June 2010. This special edition of *Philosophical Papers*, which will contain both invited and submitted papers, will appear in November of 2010.


