Guidelines for contributors

Manuscripts are considered for publication on the understanding that they are not currently under consideration elsewhere and that the material – in substance as well as form – has not been previously published.

Two copies of the manuscript should be submitted.

Each article should be accompanied by a summary, not exceeding 100 words, outlining the principal conclusions and methods in the context of currently accepted views on the subject.

All material – including quotations and notes – must be double-spaced with generous margins. Use of dot-matrix printers is discouraged.

Notes should be numbered consecutively and placed at the end of the text.

Spelling should be consistent throughout (e.g. Labour and Labor are both acceptable, but only one of these forms should be used in an article).

Turns of phrase using masculine forms as universals are not acceptable.

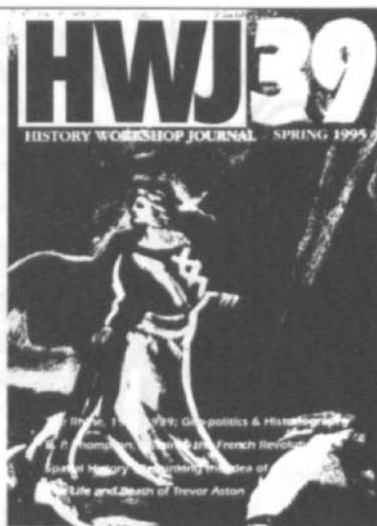
Twenty-five free offprints of each article are provided, and authors may purchase additional copies provided these are ordered at proof stage.
