Williams College

Several faculty members of the Center for Development Economics at Williams College will be enabled to accept assignments for teaching and research in Africa, Asia and Latin America, as a result of a Rockefeller Foundation grant of \$300,000. The Center has a graduate study program and a program of research on problems of economic development. It also furnishes economic services for developing countries, conducted in cooperation with governmental and private agencies. The overseas visiting faculty will be assigned to institutions at which the Foundation has cooperative programs.

SPECIAL COURSES

American Association of State Colleges and Universities

The Office of International Programs of the AASCU is establishing studyabroad centers for students and faculty of member institutions. The first of these centers will be in Mexico and in Canada: the Mexican center is affiliated with the University of the Americas, located on the outskirts of Puebla, and is administered by Adams State College, Alamosa, Colorado. Study programs for 1970–1971 are available at both undergraduate and graduate levels, and classes are given in English, except for those in the Spanish language department. Courses leading to Masters and Doctors degrees are offered at the Instituto de Ciencias Sociales, in Mexico City. Candidates must hold the degree imme-

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diately inferior to the one which they are working for, and obtain a total of 12 credits, each one the equivalent of 50 hours of seminars, courses, field work or preparation of an original thesis.
