

It is not intended for the publication of the results of original research but rather as a secondary journal, carrying reviews of, and reports on, any aspects of mammalogy. It also serves to report the proceedings of the Society's Symposia, which again are of a review nature.

Nowadays there are relatively few people who study a taxonomic group *per se*; many more become interested in the groups through the pursuit of one of the sub-disciplines such as ecology, behaviour, anatomy, physiology, genetics, etc. The journal therefore has an interdisciplinary nature and is intended for a wide readership, both amateur and professional. Contributions which promote the dissemination of knowledge of mammals or encourage their study are invited, particularly those which describe work in progress in the various disciplines and which help to bridge interdisciplinary gaps. Reports on the status and distribution of mammalian species are also welcomed.

Some issues of *Mammal Review* are devoted to the part-work *Techniques in Mammalogy*. This is intended as an introduction and source book to a range of methods and techniques applicable to mammalogy. Topics follow a natural working sequence, and the techniques described proceed from the simple to the sophisticated and are intended to introduce the appropriate methods, explain their underlying principles and limitations and their significance in mammalian research. The complete work will eventually be available as a set of back issues of the journal.
