All submissions must be typed with all written material double-spaced (including quotations, notes, information in tables, and the list of references) using only one side of the paper. A word count should be included on the title page. Typewritten lines should not exceed six and one-half inches in length. Brief parenthetical citations are included in the text; all complete references are listed alphabetically at the end of the article; and notes are used only for discursive comments and appear immediately before the list of references.
