ARCHAIC GREEK COINAGE

Athenian black figure vases bear the work of consummate artists, like Exekias, who depicted on them scenes of myth and everyday life which deepen our knowledge and understanding of Greek antiquity. In this handbook Mr. Boardman enables the reader to study the many aspects of the vases, and to grasp the essential style of a painter or group of painters, without having to consult a number of expensive, and not always easily accessible, publications. Moreover, since no systematic guide to the mythological scenes and other decorative features of the vases is available, Mr. Boardman devotes a final section to this subject.

Baroque Architecture in Classical Antiquity MARGARET LYTTELTON

Architectural historians have often noted the puzzling phenomenon of the startling baroque architectural designs displayed in the tomb facades at Petra in Southern Jordan, and in other, later Roman buildings in Syria and North Africa. Comparisons have several times been made between seventeenth-century baroque churches in Rome and the monuments of Baalbek and Petra, but no one has previously attempted systematically to investigate the origins and development of this baroque architectural style in Classical antiquity. Dr. Lyttelton sets out to chart this development, using techniques of stylistic analysis and placing particular importance on the emergence of local, regional schools of architecture in the eastern provinces of the Roman Empire. In order to study and record architectural details which throw light on the stylistic and chronological evolution of baroque architecture in antiquity, the author has travelled in a vast area of the ancient world, from Athens to Petra, and from Alexandria to Tunis. The large collection of photographs reproduced in this book, showing both Classical baroque architecture and its seventeenth-century dependents, provides a unique conspectus of the architectural decoration and surviving remains of baroque buildings in the eastern provinces of the Roman Empire.

The Elephant in the Greek and Roman World H. H. SCULLARD

Professor Scullard here examines the knowledge and use of the elephant in the Classical world in depth. Starting with the natural history of the animal he then assesses the large literature on it, and the many references to it, by Greek and Roman authors. The elephant's major role was in war, especially in Hellenistic times under Alexander the Great and his successors; then, with the ascendancy of Rome, she and her great adversary Carthage put elephants at the head of their war effort. The use of the elephant in battle, the Classical forerunner of the tank, is well brought out by contemporary accounts and battle plans of the most important engagements in which elephants were involved. The book closes with a discussion of how elephants were seen by later writers such as Philostratus, and with an assessment of them in war and peace. The plates have been selected to show how the Greeks and Romans saw the elephant in their art, especially in their sculpture, painting and coinage.

Homer and the Heroic Age

How reliable is the tradition embodied in the Homeric poems? Their basic historicity was widely accepted in the ancient world: Thucydides and Plato used Homeric data in reconstructing early Greek history and territorial claims could be supported by reference to the epic tradition.

Professor Luce, the author of the widely acclaimed *The End of Atlantis: New Light on an Old Legend*, here examines in detail the world of Homer through the literary and archaeological evidence. In the 103 years since Schliemann's first soundings on the site of Troy, archaeological investigations in Greek lands and on the Aegean coast of Turkey have been numerous and productive. The most important result of this activity has been the establishment of a firm factual basis for the Greek heroic legends; the tradition represented by the Homeric poems is a composite one, with some elements dating back to the period of the Trojan War and even further back into the Mycenaean Age. In this most readable survey Professor Luce displays the evidence for and the interpretations of a truly golden, Heroic Age.
